ABOUT THE CLINIC

- Limited number of admission tickets distributed in Fisher Pavilion at Seattle Center (Corner of 2nd Ave N & Lenny Wilkens Way)
- You cannot get both dental and vision care on the same day
- No advance registration FIRST COME, FIRST SERVED
- **DO NOT** attend if you are feeling sick
- Interpreters available
- FREE parking Mercer St. Garage (650 3rd Ave N)
- Come prepared for a long day with food, comfortable clothing and any daily medications

ALL ARE WELCOME!

- For anyone in need who struggles to access and/or afford healthcare
- Patients do not need ID or documentation of any kind
- Patients do not need to be residents of Seattle or King County

ALL SERVICES ARE FREE

DENTAL: Treatment for pain or discomfort, known or suspected cavities, swollen gums, and broken teeth.

VISION: Vision screening, complete eye exams, prescription eyeglasses. Bring a current prescription (less than two years old) to skip the eye exam and just get eyeglasses.

MEDICAL: Primary care, x-rays, mammograms, ultrasounds, select lab tests, immunizations, foot care, dermatology, physical and occupational (hand, wrist, elbow) therapy, acupuncture, nutrition, behavioral health, and more.

How Do I Get Into the Clinic?

- Get a ticket in Fisher Pavilion at Seattle Center. Fisher Pavilion opens each day at 12:30 AM for patients who arrive early (see seattlecenter.org/patients for a map and details).
- Before entry, patients and their guests will go through a health screening. Anyone with flu or COVID-like symptoms will not be admitted.
- A limited number of tickets will be given out each day starting at 5:30 AM. The ticket is only good for that day. One ticket per person.
- Patients will enter the Clinic in order of ticket number.

How Should I Prepare for the Clinic?

This may be a long day. Come prepared to take care of yourself.

- **DO NOT** attend if you are feeling sick.
- Bring food, beverages, and any medications you may need throughout the day.
- **DO NOT** fast for lab tests.
- To get dental care, you must have blood pressure and glucose within certain limits for safety.
- Wear comfortable clothing.
- Masks are optional for all participants but are strongly encouraged in crowded areas and may be required during some treatment processes. This policy may change according to public health guidance.
- Pets are not allowed unless they are trained service animals.
- A parent or legal guardian must accompany a patient under the age of 18. Exceptions may be made for youth ages 13 and above who are not in contact with a parent or legal guardian. Pediatric specialists may not be available to provide care for children.

Will Someone Speak My Language?

• Interpretation will be available throughout the Clinic.

What Happens Once I Enter the Clinic?

- There will be a large number of patients. You may not be able to get all of the services that you want or that are offered on the same day. You cannot get both dental and vision care on the same day.
- Patients can wait in line for an admission ticket on another day for additional services.
- You will be given a pass for the Clinic. This pass will allow you to leave and re-enter Clinic buildings for that day only.
- We will collect basic personal information including name, age, and a mailing address where we can send lab results and/or completed eyeglasses.
- In each service area (dental, vision or medical) you will wait your turn in line and will be seen on a first-come, first-served basis (not based on your original ticket number).
- If you are in line for service and you leave your place for a long time you will lose your place in line and will need to go to the end of the line when you return.

What Services Will NOT Be Provided?

DENTAL: Bridges, complex extractions including wisdom teeth, dentures, implants, orthodontics, root canals on molars, sedation, teeth whitening.

MEDICAL: Biopsies, casts, CT scans, stiches/sutures, immunizations for children under 18 years of age, MRIs, new prescriptions for behavioral health medications.

VISION: Contacts, sunglasses.

Opioids will not be used or prescribed.
